More Dogs Coming from Lompoc/LaPaws

We've had a lot of adoptions lately so our kennels are getting empty. Unfortunately, the kennels at our Lompoc shelter are filling up as fast as we're clearing ours out so we're transferring some dogs down to our shelter to help them out. Here are your new friends that will be coming soon:



<u>Carly:</u> 1 year old rottweiler. She's super sweet and great at getting shy dogs to play when in play groups. Andrea thinks she will be adopted in a flash out of the Santa Barbara shelter. UPDATE: I just learned she has an adoption pending in Lompoc so she may not be coming. If she does, we'll be happy to meet her!



Zeus: 11 month old mixed breed guy who is great in play groups. He was surrendered for being "disobedient," but the intake staff determined it was the fault of his former owner who refused to put the time in to train Zeus. He is eager to learn and has a lot of fun, puppy playfulness.



<u>Monte</u>: 6 year old black lab. He looks like a sweetie, but I don't have much information on him. He was brought in as a stray about a week and a half ago and was already neutered so he was someone's pet at some time.



Nelson: just under a year old, Andrea says this guy has a lot of energy and will really benefit from our dedicated volunteers. He will need a bit more work and attention than the other dogs we are transferring to prevent any kennel stress, but he's a happy friendly guy so I'm sure we're up for this fun challenge of a younger dog!



<u>Courage</u>: Courage has been at the Lompoc shelter since December. He came in with a horrible skin condition which is chronic, but is managed through medication and diet. He is friendly with other dogs and sweet with people. FAQs About Conversational Adoptions



It seems there has been some confusion about what "Conversational" or "Open" adoptions means and because of this confusion there is still apprehension on embracing a process like this. I'm hoping I can address most of the concerns with these Frequently Asked Questions, but please reach out to me if you have other concerns.

DOES OPEN ADOPTIONS MEAN THAT IF SOMEONE WANTS A DOG, WE DON'T HAVE TO SCREEN THEM TO MAKE SURE THEY ARE A GOOD MATCH? No. In fact, a conversational adoption approach actually gives you more flexibility to do what you feel is necessary to ensure the dog is going to a home that is a good match for the dog or to make the adoption easier for the dog and adopter when it's appropriate.

I HEARD WE'RE NOT DOING LANDLORD CHECKS ANYMORE. IS THAT

TRUE?While we still require landlord approval, a conversational adoption approach would mean that there is flexibility in this requirement. Our expectation is that most of the time we will need to ensure we have approval from the landlord before sending a dog to a rental property. We know that in Santa Barbara it is currently difficult to find rental properties that accept dogs and even tougher to find rentals with no breed or size restrictions. However, with conversational adoptions, you have the ability to waive this requirement based on your knowledge of the adopter, their past experience and the answers to your questions. For instance, if your adopter is considering a 10-lb. dog and they told you that their 12-year old chihuahua just passed away and they have lived at the same rental property for the last 15 years, you can safely assume that their landlord will not object to them bringing a new dog into the home. However, if you as the adoption counselor still feel you need to hear that from the landlord before you grant the adoption, then you should request that landlord approval.

I DON'T WANT TO SEND A DOG TO A HOME WITH KIDS UNLESS THE KIDS MEET FIRST, BUT I HEARD WE DON'T REQUIRE EVERYONE IN THE FAMILY TO MEET THE DOG

ANYMORE. If you feel the kids should meet the dog before the adoption is finalized, then there is probably a good reason you feel that way so we should make sure that's done. However, if you're having an open conversation with an adopter and you feel their kids are old enough or experienced enough to be able to welcome the particular dog



that adopter is considering into their home without any problems, then you can waive that requirement. We recommend that small children in the home are introduced before any dog goes home. It may not be as necessary for teenagers or other adults in the home to meet, but this is based on the dog, the adopter, the family and the conversations you

have had with those that are considering adoption. Use your best judgement and trust your gut!

CAN WE STILL DO YARD CHECKS OR HOME CHECKS? Absolutely! Again, we will not require yard checks simply because a dog is of a certain breed. However, we may require yard checks because of the dog's behavior or history of getting loose and ending up in the shelter or we might require a yard check or a home check based on concerns we may have about the adopters.

IF ALL THESE THINGS ARE NOW "FLEXIBLE," THEN WHAT IS REQUIRED TO ADOPT? We have not fully adopted the "open" adoptions process yet. We still require adopters to fill out an application. We will still verify home ownership or landlord approval unless we are advised by leadership staff that it is not necessary. We check in our computer system to make sure they have no past violations of animal cruelty, abuse or neglect. If they live in the county and their current pets are not licensed, we will advise them that they have 30 days to correct that, but we will not hold up or stop the adoption because of that. Most importantly, the adopters have to be willing to have a conversation with you about why they want to adopt and how they are prepared to care for the dog they are considering. If they are not willing to have a conversation, we are not prepared to move the adoption forward.

A new adoption process, questionnaire, adoption counselor training and adoption policy are being discussed in the Adoption Sub Committee meeting. Our ability to be flexible with past restrictions and allow a better experience for our adopters is part of this process. Consider this a test-market or trial period for the processes that are being discussed.
